Shopping Bag Toss

Materials Needed:

1 - shopping bag

6 - balls of yarn

Use two boys. Hold shopping bag by handles in teeth. Place yarn balls in bag. By swinging bag over their heads, drop balls out of bag. Do not use hands.




Balloon Bounce

Materials Needed:

1 - tall box balloons

Divide the boys into pairs and give each pair a blown-up balloon. The object is for each pair to get their balloon into the box from a starting point by only using the tops of their heads. They may maneuver around the box to get the balloon in. NO HANDS.



CRAFTS

Snowstorm Jar

Materials Needed:

Jar with screw-on lid
Waterproof cement
Small figure of your choice
Moth flakes, mica snow or crush

Moth flakes, mica snow or crushed moth balls

With glue (waterproof cement), glue a small figure inside bottom of jar or inside lid. Let dry thoroughly. Fill jar with water and add a teaspoon or two of moth flakes, mica snow, or crushed moth balls. Apply cement liberally around rim of jar. Replace lid and let dry thoroughly. Jars made a few weeks in advance allow the snow to settle rather than float. Use as a gift or just a fun craft.

Scout Sign Slide

Materials Needed:

2" x 2" square of 1/8" plywood, or balsa

2 - popsicle sticks

slide ring

Tools Needed:

sandpaper

file

knife

glue gun

light and dark stain


dark, permanent, fine-line marker

Cut the popsicle sticks into: two pieces 1-7/8" long, two pieces 1-1/2" long, and one piece 1-1/8" long. Round the edges to the same radius as in the original uncut ends.

Sand wood pieces smooth and stain the 2"x2" square dark and the popsicle sticks light.

Glue popsicle sticks to form a stylized Cub Scout sign. Glue slide ring to the back.

Add F, H, and G to the lower ringers, as shown, to represent the hidden values of Follow, Help, and Give.


GREETING CARDS one more time, and then go out for an afternoon stroll in the falling SNOW.

Soap Boat Regatta

Have the boys carve a boat of their design in a small bar of Ivory soap. Potato peelers, melon ballers, spoons, and knives can be used to carve with. "Sand" the finished carving with a piece of Scotch Brite scouring pad.

The boats must then be covered with a layer of nail polish or spray varnish.

The raceway consists of two 10 foot lengths of rain trough filled with water set on saw horses or a table.

The boys propel the boats by blowing the boat along through a straw while their hands are behind their backs.

Two cubs race at a time, and each heat is timed by a stopwatch. The best times win first, second, and third.

Rock Range

Materials Needed:

4 - plastic pirate ships (plastic jugs with lids make good pirate ships)

Twine

Lake or pool Rocks

Preparation:

Tie the twine to handle of milk jug and then to a rock as an anchor. Pirate ships are placed at various distances in the lake. Be sure to place them far away from any boat docks or designated swimming areas.

Event:


Participants take turns throwing rocks at the pirate ships. Following ideas are different ways to compete:

- (1) Lob the rocks to land on top of the pirate ships.
- (2) Most hits in a row wins.
- (3) Skip the rock on the water prior to it hitting the pirate ship.
- (4) Skip a rock on the water, over the pirate ship without touching it, and another skip before its momentum stops.

Fishing Game

You need a soda straw for each player and 15 or more paper fish.

Place the fish on the floor. Fish are caught by suction. See who can catch the most fish. Do as a relay or individually.



Raft Race

Teams line up in relay formation. The first Cub Scout in each line is the skipper and he stands with his feet on separate pads of newspaper. The second Cub Scout is the passenger and he stands on the same pads with the skipper. On a signal from the leader, the skipper bends over and takes hold of the pads, one in each hand. By shifting their weight and sliding the paper forward, the two boys maneuver themselves to the goal line without stepping off the paper. On reaching the goal, the passenger picks up the pads of paper, runs back to his team, and brings the next boy across the river. The first team to bring all of its passengers across the river wins.

Octopus Race

Divide the den into two teams of three to four boys each. The teams form with backs together, elbows linked. On signal, they race to a turning point and back to the start. First team through wins.

Deep-Sea Fishing Contest

Materials Needed:

A bucket or large pan of water

Several wooden clothespins (w/o springs)

- 2 homemade fishing poles (at least three feet long)
- 2 pieces of string
- 2 nails or bolts.

wax crayon

With wax crayon, write a number on one side of each clothespin. Tie the strings to the poles and tie a nail or bolt onto the other end of the line.

Put the clothespins in the water with the numbered side down. Cub Scouts then go "fishing," trying to maneuver the nail or bolt so that the string goes between the prongs of the clothespins and catch the "fish" by pulling up. Scoring may be on the basis of the most "fish" caught or highest point total.

CRAFTS

Gator Sculpture

Materials Needed:


A few egg cartons
3 - rectangular-shaped cartons
large pieces of stiff cardboard
colored tissue paper
glue or staples
paint
scissors




Draw an outline of a large alligator, about three feet long from its neck to its tail, on heavy cardboard. Omit the head for now. Cut out. Draw and cut out two pairs of legs from another piece of cardboard. (Rear legs longer and fatter than the front ones.) Glue or staple legs onto body. Glue or staple body over rectangular carton to shape the belly and to lift sculpture off the ground. Bend legs to touch the ground.

Glue several egg cartons to the back of the alligator, cutting and tapering to fit the shape of the body. Be sure some of the egg cups extend onto the tail section.

To construct the head, staple or glue two same-sized rectangular cartons together at one end, giving the appearance of gaping jaws. Taper the carton and notch their edges to resemble snapping jaws with mean, jagged teeth. Line the bottom and roof of the mouth with crumpled pink tissue paper. Add halves of eggshells for bulging eyes. Join head securely to the body by stapling or gluing these parts together.








How To Make A Slapstick Treasure Chest

Materials Needed:


- 30 sticks
- 4 small wood beads
- 3 yards Dura Plex Plastic Lace
- 4 cork pieces

Begin with Bottom. Lay 5 sticks flat and parallel so they touch. Now take the two larger cork pieces and spread cement on the narrowest edges. Set them on top of the sticks, one at each end, running crosswise to the sticks so that each stick is cemented. There should be an overlap of about 1/16" on each side of the cork piece.




Cement Sides. Cement in six sticks on each side and the bottom half of your chest is complete. Repeat this procedure using the 2 cork half-discs to complete the top half of

the chest. Place the two halves together and cement on the plastic binding as shown. This will act as the hinges and also be decorative.



Cement on the small beads. The small beads are to be cemented on each corner of the bottom of the chest to serve as "feet." Your project is now complete. However, you may wish to stain the chest with wood stain, or paint it in your favorite color, or decorate it with gold thread, etc.

PIRATES: (all at once) "Aye, we're lost." "We're hungry.," "We're thirsty."

Advancement: The awards are pinned to pictures of skull-&-crossbones. Pass out the booty to the Cubs and parents being honored. Keep all the Scouts up front. "Congratulations mates on a job well done, now you must take the Pirate's Pledge promising to work hard towards your next achievement.

Do as I do and repeat after me:

To know us is to love us.



THE ORIGIN OF OUR FLAG

Most people in America think that the stars and stripes were ordered by General George Washington; that Betsy Ross sewed the first flag; and that the revolutionary forces used this flag from the day the Declaration of Independence was signed.

The story of the stars and stripes is the story of the nation itself; the evolution of our free institutions and the nation's development into a great land.

Early in the days of the Republic, when the 13 original states were still colonies, the banners borne by the Revolutionary forces were as varied as the races that made up the liberty-loving colonists. The local flags and colonial devices displayed in battle on land and sea during the first months of the American revolution carried the varied grievances that the individual states had against their mother Country, England.

After July 4, 1776, the people of the colonies felt the need of a national flag to symbolize their new spirit of unity and independence. Congress, on July 14, 1777, Adopted the following resolution: Resolved that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, that the union be thirteen stars, white on a blue field. The significance of the colors was defined as: White signifies Purity and Innocence; Red, Hardiness and valor; Blue, Vigilance, Perseverance and justice.


Betsy Ross, a flag maker of Philadelphia, is credited by some historians with having made the first flag and with having suggested that the stars be five-pointed. The home of Betsy Ross at 230 Arch Street, Philadelphia, is a national shrine and the flag flies on a



staff from her third floor window. Thousands of people of all nations visit this house, which is known as the Birthplace of Old Glory.

It is true that Betsy Ross was a flag maker. There is in the Navy archives an order to Elizabeth Ross 'for making ships colors' for 14 pounds, 12 shillings and 2 pence, paid to her exactly two weeks before the flag resolution of June 14, 1777. None of the authentic records of history substantiate the story that Betsy Ross was appointed by congress to design a flag. Neither the annals of the Continental Congress nor the personal writings of anyone, including George Washington, shed light on the question of when, where, or by whom the first American flag was made.

But regardless of whom was responsible for making the first flag, the stars and stripes, born in the midst of battle, proudly announce to the world the birth of a new nation. However obscure its origin, the flag was soon hailed universally as the symbol of the land of the free.



OUR FLAG TODAY

Although two more stars have been added to the blue union since 1912, the proportional dimensions of the flag remain the same.

The stars were added for the two new states admitted *(Alaska-1959 and Hawaii-1959) Making the 27th official change in the flag since its creation in 1777.

UNION JACK (Navy)

Always has the same number of stars as the national flag. The above dimensions are for one size. National flag copied from an official blueprint, furnished manufactures of flags for the U. S. Government by the bureau of ships. Other size flags follow these same proportions which are the scale of 1 to 19. The union Jack's proportions are the same as the canton on the national flag.

FLAG TERMS

Burgee: A small triangular or swallowtail pennant

Canton: Upper corner of flag's own right. *The point of honor*. Also called the *Union*.

Colors: The national regimental, or organization flag. A banner, standard, ensign.

Courtesy Flag: Another nation's flag hoisted on special occasions. Example, a ship entering a foreign port.

Ensign: National flag flown by a naval vessel. Same as a standard in some countries. **Fimbriation:** The narrow lines separating the colors.

Badge: Emblem, device, seal, usually on the field.

Bend on: Attach a flag to a halyard.

Bunting: Inexpensive cotton or thin wool cloth for flags and patriotic decoration.

Field: The ground of each division of a flag. The U.S. flag is divided into a red and white striped field, and a white starred field.

Flag Hoist: One or more signal flags on one halyard.

Fly: Length of a flag from end to end. Also the end away from the canton, called *free* end.

Furl: To wrap or roll tightly. Opposite of unfurl, meaning to allow flag to fly freely.

Case: Bag or container for storing the colors.

Garrison Flag: Large 20 by 38 feet flag. Grommet: Metal eyelet for halyard.

Ground: Same as field.

Guidon: Small flag to designate guide, company's number or initial, or line or dress formation of.

Halyard: Rope for hoisting and lowering flag.

Hoist: Width of flag at canton side. To raise a flag.

Jack: Rectangular flag flown from Jackstaff on bow of vessel. U.S. white stars on a blue field.

Pennant: Triangular flag, swallowtail flag or streamer

Post Flag: Ten by nineteen feet flag. **Reeve:** To pass a rope through a pulley.

Retreat: Lower flag at sundown. Staff: The pole a flag hangs from.

Standard: A banner, ensign colors. Personal banner of a ruler, flag of mounted or mechanized units.

Storm Flags: 5 by 9 foot, 6 inches flag flown in bad weather.

Strike The Flag: To lower flag as sign of surrender.

Swallowtail: Tapering flag with free end divided into two or more pointed tails.

Truck: Top of flagpole to which flag is hoisted. Often has ornament attached to cap.

Union: Same as canton. Also the whole of a flag as the *Union Jack* on the U.S. Naval Vessels.

Vexillary: A standard-bearer in ancient roman legion.

HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW "OLD GLORY"?

Can you draw an accurate picture of the flag? Most of us could do a reasonable job, but how much of the following would be omitted from your drawing?

The flag has 13 horizontal stripes of equal width, seven red separated by six white. The union or canton consists of 50 five-pointed white stars on a blue field, placed in the upper quarter next to the staff and extending to the lower edge of the fourth red stripe from the top.

The union has nine staggered rows of stars, with six stars in five rows and five stars in four alternating rows, each with points upward.

Mini-Busts

Assortment of colored paper, yarn, etc. for trimming.




Directions:







Equipment needed:


1 - Table

Players must stay in a kneeling position and are not allowed to stand and lean over the table to gain unfair advantage over the opponent.

Players may not use lips, noses, shoulders, or any other part of the anatomy to block the ball and keep it from rolling off the edge of the table. Only lung power is acceptable.



The ball is placed in the center of the table to start the game. Upon the signal to go, players attempt to blow the ball past the opposing teams defense onto the floor. Each time it goes off the table the other side receives a point.

The first team to score five points is the winner.

Helpful hint: Pass out a breath mint to each player prior to the start of the game!

A Barometer

This Barometer is a piece of paper that changes color. In dry weather it is blue, when moist, lavender; and a change in weather will record red.

To prepare, dip white blotting paper into the following solution:

4 oz water 1 oz chloride of cobalt 1/2 oz common salt 75 grains calcium chloride 1/4 oz gum Arabic

This will yield about 50 barometers.

As soon as the blotting paper is dry, set your imaginations loose. Cut into pieces to fit into a picture. Paste this onto a piece of wood or cardboard and attach a string of ring to the back.




Directions:




High-Gliding Planes


The keel of a paper plane does lots of things to help it fly. It makes the body of the plane stiff, it keeps it pointed in the direction in which it was aimed, and it also makes the plane easy to launch.




But there is no rule that says a plane must have a keel, even though most of them do, and of the cutout planes can just as easily be made without one. But planes without a kiel fly very differently from planes that have. They will not go as far, but they will float much better and stay up in the air much longer.




To make a plane without a keel, start out as if you were making a cutout plane. Starting with Diagram 1, Fold the paper in half the short way, and fold the ends in to make a point. then fold the tip of the point down so that it meets at the cross line.




Now take a small piece of scotch tape and fasten down the point. Fold the whole plane in half along the center crease, and cut it into shape just like before. In addition, try cutting a hole in it, just in back of the spot where the point is taped down. The easiest way to do this is with the plane folded in half.



When you have finished cutting the plane out, don't fold down wings. Instead, just open out the plane up flat. That's all there is to it. Your plane is ready to fly.



This kind of plane needs to be launched very gently, just like a flying wing. Hold it at the tail, between your thumb and first finger. Give it a little nudge, and let it go. It should float in the air very smoothly, and glide to a gentle stop. You can make flaps and curl the wings, just like with any other kind of plane.



Airplane Weather Vane


Supplies needed:


- 1 12" piece of 1"x 4" wood
- 1 9"x 6" piece of 1/4" plywood
- 1 2" length of 5/19" tubing
- 1 large nail and washer sand paper and paint

Use the pattern (next page) to cut the body from the 1 x 4. Cut the wings from the 1/4" plywood. Sand the wood smooth, then glue the wings onto the body. Let the glue dry before further work. Before painting the plane, find the pivot point under the plane where it balances evenly. Drill 5/16" hole 1/2" deep. Insert the piece of tubing into the hole and glue it in place. The plane is then ready to paint.

To put up the weather vane cut the head from the nail and drive the nail into whatever the vane is going to set upon. Drive it deep enough so that the tubing touches the wood. Then put the washer on the nail to act as a bearing for the tubing. A small amount of grease or Vaseline will help the plane pivot.





Atomic Challenge


You are part of a special team trained to safely move atomic material. The container in the center is in danger of leakage. Your job is to move it safely to the decontamination zone without spilling the contents. This fun game challenges you with team work, cooperation, and finesse. This game is designed for six to eight participants.

Equipment Needed:

One small inner tube (inside hole of tube should be a little smaller than the bucket)
One 10 foot rope per player
One empty bucket
Two, twelve to eighteen feet circles marked off

Tie one end of each rope at intervals around the inner tube.

The bucked containing the "Atomic Material" is placed in the center of the large radiation zone circle.



The participants must use ropes and work together to stretch the inner tube over the bucket and then release the pressure slightly so the tube holds onto the bucket. As a team move the bucket containing "Atomic Material" into the decontamination zone

circle, which is the safe area. Participants cannot enter either circle of they are eliminated from the game.

A variation of this game is to have the players play blindfolded and follow the directions of the leader.

Flying Saucer Landing

Equipment Needed:

Frisbee

- 3 ropes of different lengths to form 3 rings for landing pads.
 - One ring to be marked 10 points, another 15 points and the 3rd, 25 points. Mark rings from largest to smallest with the smallest being 25 points.

Each boy stands 10 feet from the landing pads and tosses the Frisbee to land on a landing pad. Each boy receives 3 tries. Of the three tries the scores are added and this is the Cub Scouts score.

Space Man (Variation of musical chairs)

Arrange a line of chairs so that they face in alternate directions. Have just enough so that every player can sit down, except one. He is the Space Man who walks around the outside of the line. Each sitting person must think of some planet, star or constellation, or something that exists in space. They continue to sit there as the Spaceman walks around the line, calling out all the names he can think of, Pluto, Mars, Venus, Sputnik, etc.

When the Spaceman calls out something that a person is thinking of, this person must rise and follow him. He joins in by calling out names that have not already been called. Before long the Spaceman has a trail of satellites following him. After most of the people are up the Spaceman calls out: "Falling Meteor". Everyone tries to find a seat. This leaves one person in outer space. (still standing) Those who were still seated must tell what heavenly body they were thinking of.

Sun Spot Tag

You need a sunny day and wall. (Game works best if the wall is in shadow so the spots show up well) Give each Cub a small pocked mirror. Hold mirror so it reflects a spot of sunlight on the wall. After a short practice moving spots around, choose an "It". It chases the other players' spots around the wall with his spot. When It's spot touches another spot, the owner of that spot becomes "It".

Astronaut Training

Equipment Needed:

- 2 bean bags
- 2 jump ropes
- 2- rubber balls

This is a good physical fitness relay. Divide players into two teams and stand behind starting line. At a turning line, 15 feet away, are 3 items, jump rope, bean bag, and ball. On signal, first player from each team runs to turning line, takes jump rope, jumps 10 times, tosses bean bag in air 10 times, and bounces ball on floor 10 times. He runs back to his team, touches the next player, who repeats the action. First team to finish wins,



CRAFTS

Sponge Painting

Supplies Needed:

Sponge

Scissors

Dry tempera paint

Paper

Soak the paper thoroughly in water. Lay the wet paper on a smooth surface and remove all the wrinkles and excess water. Use pieces of moist sponge which have been cut into small shapes and use as a brush by dipping them into the tempra paint.

Rock Creatures

Smooth flat rocks can be obtained at the beach or river areas. Dirt and foreign matter should be removed by washing rocks with detergent. Be sure they are completely dry before you begin to decorate.

Use acrylic paints. If rocks are to be different colors, it is best to paint rocks before assembly. If the entire figure is one color, the rocks may be glued together first, then painted.

Use contact cement to glue the rocks together. It helps to saturate a small piece of cotton with glue and place between the rough edged rocks. They will adhere better if you do this. After pieces are glued together it's a good idea to run a collar of white glue of household cement around all joints to make a firm lasting bond.

Use your imagination in adding features, such as yarn for hair, broom straws for whiskers, chenille stems for tails, etc.

Don't try to "plan" these rock creatures. Let the boys find some of the rocks on their own---you furnish some extras. Then provide paint, glue, and an assortment of "extras". Let each boy use his imagination to create his own alien

rockets to make the *Rocket Ship* leave the ground and head toward the moon.







Candy Bar Scamper

Dress up for a fast junk food attack!



Equipment Needed:

Old hat

Necktie or scarf

One pair of gloves

Butter knife

Fork

Assorted candy bars individually gift

wrapped

One pair of dice

This game is designed for four or more players. Everyone sits on the floor in a circle. One person must dress up in the clothing items named above.

The person to his left has the dice. Upon the "GO" signal the "dressed up person" tries to quickly open a gift wrapped candy bar with the butter knife and fork, while the player to his left begins to roll the dice.

Each player gets three tries to roll doubles. If that player is successful, he quickly passes the dice to the person to his left. As soon as someone has rolled doubles, the clothes, knife and fork are quickly passed to that person. That player then puts on the clothes and has a chance to extract the candy from it's wrapping, while the others are attempting to roll doubles.

Play continues until all the candy bars are successfully removed from their wrapping.

CAUTION: This game can become very fast and frantic. Be careful <u>not</u> to throw the utensils when changing players.

Creative Dramatize (Pantomime)

Fill a large bowl with slips of paper on which is written instruction such as:

(All over body activities)

- 1. Bat balloons high into the air.
- 2. Skip rope all around the room.
- 3. Crawl through a thick jungle full of longhanging branched and heavy vines

(Smaller aspects of body talk)

- 1. Have one boy pitch a ball and another catch (asking such questions as "Will the ball be pitched high? Low? Hard?")
- 2. Walk a tightrope in the air.
- 3. Follow a buzzing fly around the room and finally swat it.
- 4. Brush teeth, wash hands and face.

(Animal pantomime)

- 1. A cat waking up from a nap.
- 2. A cat watching a bird.
- 3. A cat rubbing up against a person's leg.
- 4.A cat curling up and going to sleep.

(Then try these)

- 1. A dog walking along, sniffing the ground.
- 2. A dog sitting up and begging.
- 3. A person being nice.
- 4. A person looking mean.

(Mood pantomime)

- 1. No school today.
- 2. The picnic has been called off.
- 3. I have the measles.
- 4. We're lost.

This form of charades is fun for the boys as well as a direct learning exercise for warming up to pantomime. Choose your skit and play charades with it first. Your boys will be practicing as well as having fun, then you can get down to business in a much lighter mood.

Quick Change Relay

This is a fast, furious relay with a twist. Equipment Needed per team:
One hat
One overcoat
One necktie
One pair gloves

Players are lined up in relay formation with no more then six players per team. Relay teams are divided in half and are about 30 feet apart.

On the "go" signal the first player in line puts in the hat, overcoat, necktie, and gloves and races to his awaiting teammates. He then takes off the relay clothes and his teammate puts them on and returns to the starting point. Play continues until each person has participated. The first team to have all players make the quick change and cross the finish line is the winner.



Can't Be Done

This one looks easy, but it can't be done. Place both heels against the wall and then try to pick something up from the floor.

Strong Paper

Ask if any one has seen the new strong paper that will support a glass. Show an ordinary piece of paper and lay it as a bridge between two glasses. Naturally it won't support a glass. In order to do it you simply pleat the paper. For best results, make pleats about 1/2' wide.

Pack Man

Each person is given 5 pieces of plastic fruit. Place one piece between the knees, one under the chin and one under each elbow. The last is placed on the floor. Player must get to the finish line, deposit 4 pieces into an open grocery sack and kick the last piece over the line without using their hands.


Clown Mobile

Materials Needed: Construction paper,

Cut out two clown heads. Cut two hair pieces and three 2" threads. When pasting the heads together, position and paste hair and threads between the heads. Cut out two red noses, and paste one on each side of head. Cut out two yellow balls, and paste on tip of hat, placing thread between to hang mobile. Cut out four eyes, and paste on each side of threads. Cut out two pink mouths, paste together with thread between.

Gangster: (tough) Okay, wise guy, I got you dead to rights, see! One false move and you're a dead pigeon, see! Try to take my doll away from me eh! Why, you cheap, chiseling punk, for two cents I'd......

Recipe: (calm) set carefully in 2 1/2 quarts of boiling water. Then when the entire mixture has heated to the boiling point, again, slowing stir in the whites of two eggs and.......

Story Teller: (sweetly)...Little Red Riding Hood. Yes, children, today I'm going to tell you the story of the little girl who went through the woods to grandmother's house all by herself. Once upon a time, there was a little girl who lived at the edge of a great forest. One day the little girl said to her tiny gray-haired little mother.......

Boy Scout: (loud and clear) How would you like to join the Boy Scouts of America? There's a troop in your neighborhood, you know. Yes, you too can join the ranks of the Boy Scouts of America, the number one organization for boys and young men. And what red-blooded American boy has never said to himself.

The Disappearing Bandanna

Props: 4 or more assistants and one ripe banana

The assistants have been carefully selected for their ability to follow directions exactly. Four assistants take their places behind the announcer. Bandannas are concealed in the hip pocket. The banana is carefully kept behind the 'dolts' back.

Announcer: (Straight faced at all times) Remove the bandannas from your pockets and show them to the audience. (Note: hold

the bandanna in front of you and show both sides. The one with the banana shows a banana with confidence.)

Announcer: Fold the bandanna in half again (Note: everyone folds the bandanna again to a smaller square. The one with the banana expresses more concern, looks left and right, uses facial expressions to demonstrate an uncomfortable feeling. He breaks the banana again.)


Announcer: Hold the bandanna in you left hand and fold in the four corners. (Note: Everyone complies. 
Announcer: Open your hand and show that the bandanna has disappeared. (Note: Of course it has and applause is appropriate.)

Bird Hunt

While everyone stands in a circle, pin the name of a bird on each Cub Scout's back. Give each a pencil and a card. The object is to find the names of as many birds as possible while avoiding showing his own back. No one may stand still with his back against a wall or tree.

CRAFTS

Paper Plate Owl

With rounded sides out, staple two paper plates together around the rim. Make each wing by folding another plate in half, without creasing, and staple it near the top of the body. For the head, fold about one third of a plate over and staple it. Attach to the body with more staples.

Paint the owl and add details with cut paper and markers. Slip a piece of yarn through the fold of the head. Knot the ends together.

Fluffy Owl

Dab glue between the petals of a pine cone. Stuff a thin layer of cotton between these petals. Glue a yarn loop on top of the pine cone. Blue on feet and facial features cut from felt.


For Hungry Birds Only

How about making a bird feeder for your feathered friends who remain in your back yard during the winter? If they give you a song, it seems that it is only fair that you should give them a supper worthy of that beautiful chirping!

Before you decide that, yes, you would like to feed the birds this winter, remember that you must continue feeding them without interruption until spring. Birds establish firm winter feeding territories. No matter how hungry they get, territorial considerations keep them with in a certain area. so, when you set out that first bird feeder, it's like promising the birds, "I will set food for you here all winter long." Be sure you mean it!

Be a good host to your flying friends. In addition to setting out food for them throughout the winter, remove any snow which may cover the feeder. It'll make dining so much more pleasant.

Certain birds prefer certain foods. No one food will satisfy all birds, so experiment with a variety of main courses for your feathered guests.



When using peanut butter, mix it with seed or suet. Crush eggshells into tiny pieces and mix it with suet or peanut butter (a good way for birdies to get their calcium). White bread isn't as nutritional as other foods, but it's a good way to lure birds to your banquet table


There was a Scandinavian custom at Christmas of tying a sheaf of wheat or oats to a long pole. The pole was raised on Christmas Eve for the birds to enjoy. Each family would compete with the others to see how high it could raise its pole.

You can do the same thing. If you don't have wheat or oats, substitute corn on the cob or pieces of bread. The birds will love it

Cover a pine cone with peanut butter. Then roll it in birdseed. With string, hang the pine cone from the branch of a tree.

Slapstick Wren House

- 1. MAKE THE FLOOR. Lay 10 sticks flat and parallel so they touch. This is the floor for your Wren House. Spread cement on the bottom of the cork triangles that will make the walls of the house and set them into place, one at each end of the floor running crosswise to the sticks so that each stick is cemented to the cork triangles.
- 2. MAKE THE ROOF. Spread cement on the slanting sides of the triangles and start laying your sticks across beginning at the top. Put the very top one standing on its side. For extra strength put a little glue on the sides of each Slapstick before you put it in place.



3. ATTACH A PERCH. Finish your Wren House by cementing the remaining stick in place for the perch as shown in the illustration. You may wish to spray paint it or dye it by dipping into a deep vessel of dye. Either nail it to a tree branch, garage or attach a string or wire to the top and hang it from limb of a tree or on a hook on house or garage.







Score one point for each person who buttons from the bottom to the top. (Button it **up** were the instructions) Team with most points wins.

Shooting From The Hip


This game promotes team work, cooperation, skill, and uncontrollable laughter from the observers.

Equipment Needed:

One pair of old panty hose for each player One balloon for every two players One orange for every two players

Divide all the participants into teams of two. Have each person tie one leg of a panty hose around their waist and let the other leg hang the their side. In each team, one person drops an orange into the panty hose leg that

is not tied around the waist. The other team member ties his extra hanging panty hose leg above the orange of the first player so that the orange hangs between them. It should be long enough to hang down somewhere between the knee and the ankle. Inflate the balloons and place on the starting line in front of the hanging oranges. Mark a finish line about ten to fifteen feet away.



Upon the "GO" signal, each team swings their hips in unison to make the orange swing and hit the balloon. They quickly continue swinging their orange, with no hands allowed, moving the balloon across the floor toward the finish line. The first team to hit their balloon across the finish line wins.


(Helpful Hint) This game is best conducted away from air currents that might blow the balloons around.




Backwards Relay

This game promotes agility, dexterity, and confusion.

Equipment Needed:

One four foot long nylon rope per relay team



Divide into teams and assign a referee for each team. Line up as shown above. One at a time participants run to the referee where they are given the rope. They then turn their back to the referee and tie a square knot behind their back. The referee verifies that

it is correct at which time they give the rope back to the referee and run back and tag the next player. Play continues until each has tied a "backwards knot". This is not as easy as it sounds!

Distance Throw

A game of strength, accuracy, and patience! Equipment Needed:

One, 1/4 inch by fifty foot rope.

Five markers

1 IVC IIIai KCI

Five stakes

Mark throw line then measure and mark distances of ten, twenty, thirty, forty, and fifty feet. Using a slip knot, put a small loop in the end of a fifty foot rope to put around the players hand. Have them coil the rope in the other hand. Each person throws the rope to see how far it will go. They cannot let go of the loop at the end. Each participant has three tries and then chooses his best throw.

(Helpful Hint) If you hold the middle of the rope coiled in one hand and other half coiled in the other hand, the weight of the first coil will slowly uncoil the other half. This will make the rope go farther.



LARIAT AND BRANDING IRON TIE SLIDE

Materials Needed:


- 1 1/2"x 2" piece of masonite or heavy cardboard
- 10" piece of twine or light weight macramé cord
- Black pipe cleaner
- Vinyl or pipe cleaner

Make lariat from 10" piece of twine or macramé cord and coil. Use pipe cleaner to form branding iron. Glue both lariat and iron to masonite, Glue vinyl or pipe cleaner to back side for slide.



One Shooter

Any boy would enjoy testing his accuracy in hitting a target with this rubber band gun. For Cub Scouts the guns should be cut out-Make the finger hole with a large drill bit and the boys can do the sanding and attach the clothespin. The clothespin must be taken apart so the lower half can be nailed to the gun with small nails for better stability. 3/4" scrap wood is needed to make the gun. A heavy cardboard box is a good target.



Indian Head Tie Slide

For an Indian head neckerchief slide or lapel pin, cut a piece of corncob 1 1/2" long. Glue braided yarn across top for hair. Glue on seeds, paper or pieces of cob for features. Glue on a headband made of a string of tiny beads or plastic lacing. Insert feather. Attach a curtain ring to back.



Spinning A Yarn

A long (several yards)piece of yarn with knots tied randomly along the length is needed. Some knots should be close, others far apart. The object is to have a group of people make up a story after the leader has given them a theme. Each person talks while winding the yarn around a ruler until they reach a knot, then the next person continues the story.

Hoop and Spear

Use a basket hoop or make one 12 inches in diameter or larger out of a pliable stick bent to form a hoop. Make a spear 5 feet long and 3/4 to 1 inch in diameter. The game consists of rolling the hoop on the ground and players taking turns at throwing the spear at the moving hoop to stop it and get points, according to where the hoop color and spear color touch. Red counts 10 points, Yellow 4, Blue 3, Green 1. Make sure that all players are on the same side of the hoop.

Indian Giveaway (Commanche)

Boys stand in a circle with the leader (Chief) standing just outside the circle. The chief throws small sticks(Pop sickle sticks) one at a time into the circle. Each stick represents and Indian blanket. The first boy to recover the stick after it touches the ground gets it as his prize. This game teaches young braves to be alert and fast.

Feather Race

The quill ends of feathers are stuck lightly into the ground. The contesting braves line up behind a starting line up behind a starting line and on the word "GO", each races to his feather and without kneeling, plucks his feather from the ground by using his teeth, and races back to the starting line with it. If played indoors, place feathers between two boards.








Slapstick Star Burst Mat

Drill hole in slapsticks. Or buy sticks with holes already drilled. Each stick has two holes, one at the end and one in the middle. You will need 1 yard of elastic thread on which to thread the sticks. You will also need 33 small wood beads and 33 slapsticks. Plus dye or paint if you wish to color your Sunburst Mat.

Thread Slapsticks. Using a needle or just your hands, thread the elastic through all "end" holes in the sticks. Pull snug. Tie a knot and cut off the excess elastic. Follow the same procedure for the middle holes but alternate beads between each stick so that your mat will look like the finished illustration. Pull the elastic snug (not too tightly of your mat will buckle).





Tie a knot in the elastic. Cut off the excess elastic and your Sunburst Mat is complete, unless you wish to dye or paint it. The fastest way is to dye the mat by dipping it in a deep-dish of dye, any color you wish. If you desire a multicolored Sunburst Mat, it is necessary to complete the coloring process prior to assembly. They can also be spray painted or splatter painted.



Indian Dirt Ball

Equipment Needed:

Tennis Ball

Broom stick for each Cub Scout

2 Boxes for goals

Divide Cub Scouts into 2 teams. Place ball in the middle of the playing area, On the sound of the whistle each team will try to maneuver the ball to their goal to earn points (usually 1 point per goal) while the other team tries to steal the ball and make a goal of their own.

The ball cannot be batted across the playing area. It must be rolled across the floor to the goal.

Strict rules are needed for this on the handling of the broom sticks.

As a substitute for broom sticks use wooden yard sticks or rolled up newspaper.

Siamese Twins Race

This is a race. A pair of players stand back to back with a broom stick between their legs, and their hands on the end of the stick. They then race from the starting point and back. They must hold onto the stick, one goes forward, and the other goes backward. the turning point is where they change direction and return. They do not turn, but stop and reverse direction. Thus a player goes backward one direction and forward the other.

Unicorn

Equipment Needed:

2 - baseball caps

2 - 10 inch dowels

Tape

String

Paper clips

Canning jar rings


2 - safety goggles

Preparation: Tie the rope overhead in a manner that will allow you to hang the canning jar rings as shown in the illustration. Tie different lengths of string to the length of rope. Open paper clips as shown and tie them to the opposite ends of the string. Hang canning ring on the paper clips. Tape the dowel to the top of the hat bill as shown.

Player puts on their safety goggles, unicorn hat, and mount the broom like a stick horse. He is now the unicorn. The object of the game is to ride through the rings, spearing as many as possible in a 15 second time period. rings must stay in the dowel to count as points. The player spearing the most rings in the time period wins.



CRAFTS

Corn Cob Donkey

Materials Needed:

1 - medium-size corn cob

Corn silk

- 1 Corn husk
- 4 pieces of wood dowels or sticks 1/4" round, 2" long

Small kitchen knife

Glue

2 - Peppercorns

Scrape off all corn kernels with a knife. With the knife, cut the corn cob into 3 pieces; about 1 1/4" of the tapered end for the head, 1 1/4" for the neck and the rest of the cob for the body. It is easier to cut through the cob while it is still soft; then let the pieces dry for about a week.





Cut dowel or stick into 4 - 2" pieces. Put a small amount of glue on one end of a piece of the stick and place it on the bottom of the body, at the back. Push it firmly into a kernel hole. Do the same for the other back leg. Place the other 2 legs at the front of the bottom. Put the body on the table and see if the legs stand. Let glue dry in standing position. Glue neck part on top of the front of the body in an upright position.





Glue the head to the neck with the tapered end facing front. Wait for glue to dry. Put glue on back of head and lower part of neck and put on as muck corn silk as you can. Let glue dry, trim mane. Glue silk onto end of donkey. Let dry and trim tail.

Cut a 1 1/2" square piece from corn husk for saddle. Glue on top of body. Cut 2 pieces of husk, Tapered at both ends, for the ears. Glue onto head. Glue in 2 peppercorn, one on each side of head, for eyes.





Preparations:


Glue the title, the instructions, and the map to a large piece of heavy cardboard or wood. Decorate the game and board with color if you wish


After the glue has thoroughly dried, coat the entire board with clear shellac or varnish to provide a hard finish.

Instructions:

- 1. The object of this game for two or more players is to make a trip from "home" to the "park".
- 2. The rider who gets to the "park" first wins the game.
- 3. Each player uses a bean or small button for his marker.
- 4. All players start at the space marked "home". Players take turns.

- 5. To determine the number of spaces to move forward, a player holds a pencil (with the eraser end down) above the "bicycle wheel". Closing his eyes, the player circles the pencil above the wheel, then brings the pencil down until it touches the wheel. The number on which the pencil lands tells the number of spaces the player moves his marker. If the pencil lands outside the "bicycle wheel" or touches a line, the player tries again.

- 7. A rider must not "speed" into the "Park", but must arrive there on an even count.





Magic Crystal Garden

Watch beautiful crystals grow in this fascinating garden.

Ingredients Needed:

6 Tbsp - Salt

6 Tbsp - Water

A couple of drops of food coloring

6 Tbsp - Laundry Bluing

1 Tbsp - Ammonia

5 or 6 pieces of charcoal

Mix salt, water, bluing, and ammonia in large bowl. Put 5 or 6 pieces of charcoal in glass container.

Pour mixture over charcoal pieces. Sprinkle drops of food coloring on charcoal to give your garden color. Set container in warm place. Check back from time to time to see how your garden is growing. It will continue to grow until the liquid is absorbed.

If you want to move your garden, move it gently to avoid breaking the delicate crystals.

You can make a mini garden by pouring the liquid over one or two pieces of charcoal on a small drinking glass or apothecary jar.

Crushed Ice Candles

Materials:

Disposable heat resistant container
Candle wicking 2 inches longer than container
Crayons or candle coloring
Wax
Crushed Ice

Cover working surface with newspaper, cut wax into small pieces and place in a double


boiler (do not melt wax over direct heat). As wax begins to melt, dip wick into it and stretch out straight on waxed paper to dry. Add color to wax. Color will be darker when wax cools. Wax will be ready to pour when it reaches 170 degrees F. If thermometer is not available, heat for a minuet or two after wax is completely melted. When wax is about ready to pour, place weighted wick (use a paper clip) in container. Use a spring clothespin to hold wick at the top of container. Pour crushed ice around wick and pour wax over ice. Allow to cool until hard. To speed setting, place in refrigerator for 10-15 minutes. Pour out melted ice then remove the candle from the mold. It may be necessary to place the mold in hot water for 5-10 seconds to remove the candle.




